Somali Journalist Assassinated

Somali journalist assassinated in Galkayo

- Somali television journalist Liban Abdullahi Farah, known as Liban Qaran, was assassinated in Galkayo Sunday night (July 7th) by unknown assailants
- Farah is the fifth Somali journalist to be killed this year.
- He represented UK-based Kalsan TV and had previously worked for Radio SBC, Radio Daljir,
 Codka Nabada Radio and Royal Television.
- The National Union of Somali Journalists (NUSOJ) condemned his killing and called for the Puntland regional administration to investigate the crime

Humanitarian Needs in Somalia

Humanitarian needs in Somalia remain immense, UN official says during visit

- Despite gradual improvements in the humanitarian situation in Somalia, the needs remain immense, a senior United Nations relief official said today, calling for greater investment to break the cycle of crisis in the Horn of Africa nation
- An estimated 1 million people in Somalia urgently require humanitarian assistance and a further 1.7 million need sustained support to avoid falling back into crisis, OCHA said in a news release.
- In addition, one in seven children in Somalia is malnourished and polio has recently re-emerged after more than six years without a reported case. But the Somalia Humanitarian Appeal for 2013 is just 33 per cent funded.

Humanitarian crisis takes hold in Kismayo while rivals vie for power

- Continuing battles between forces loyal to Jubbaland presidential rivals are exacerbating the already strained humanitarian situation for civilians in Kismayo as security in the city continues to break down, relief workers say
- Last month alone, at least 71 people died and 300 were wounded in the fighting. The escalating insecurity has caused a halt to humanitarian aid and services to the city, leaving hospitals without supplies and people without food and shelter.
- The Somali federal government sent three airplanes to Kismayo July 2nd to transport more than 50 patients to Mogadishu for further medical treatment. Another 26 victims were sent to Galkayo the next day. More than 40 patients -- mostly women and children -- remain at Kismayo Hospital.
- The battles in Kismayo also have displaced thousands of residents, said Abdullahi Mohamed of the Fanole Human Rights and Development Organisation. Most of those fleeing their homes to



neighbouring villages were women and children living without adequate food and shelter, he said.

- Insecurity in Kismayo had already created a humanitarian crisis by impeding the delivery of relief supplies, said Abdulqadir Abdullahi, deputy director of Gurmad, a relief and development organisation in Kismayo.
- "The suspension of the vaccination campaigns that had targeted 24,000 people from all age
 groups is extremely worrying in light of the outbreak of the polio virus in the southern and
 central parts of Somalia," he said. "Relief workers cannot do their jobs of providing
 humanitarian assistance to those affected unless the security situation in Kismayo improves

Puntland region postpones local council elections

- The Puntland regional government on Sunday (July 14th) suspended long-awaited local council elections scheduled for Monday, saying the risk of violence was too great to hold them.
- It gave no further details on who it feared would cause the violence and no date has been set for the elections, with the administration saying only they would be held "when it is appropriate".
- "The UN is not part of the elections process, but we welcome the democratisation process in Puntland," Kay said during a joint press conference Saturday, according to Somalia's Garowe Online. But on Sunday, Kay called the suspension "wise" and urged restraint from all sides "following violent clashes", according to AFP.
- Clashes have broken out in political rallies in the region -- including in Galkayo earlier this month in which five people were killed -- although other demonstrations were peaceful
