## Nurturing Peace in Contexts of Global Violence: A Conference for Religious Educators, Scholars and Leaders

May 22-25, 2013

at New York Theological Seminary 475 Riverside Drive (at 120<sup>th</sup> Street), New York City

Religious leaders throughout the world in every faith tradition are challenged today to be active agents of peace. How can academic institutions and faith-based grass roots organizations that are training religious leaders be more effective in teaching the ways of peace? Working together with scholars, policy makers, and activists, how can we all advance peacemaking more effectively within our various communities?

This conference will explore these questions as we seek to work together to teach and learn about peacemaking both locally and globally. Bringing together scholars and religious leaders, we plan to explore existing programs, develop a fuller analysis of what peace means in our diverse religious and cultural our contexts, and plan together for more effective ways of teaching peacemaking.

The conference planners invite papers on the following themes from junior scholars and graduate students working in all academic disciplines for a dedicated session on Saturday morning, May 25:

- Peacemaking in response to violence against women and children, to explore how religious communities are forging alternatives to violence, protesting injustice, nurturing peace, and empowering women and children?
- Peacemaking in contexts of violence against marginalized communities, to explore how religious leaders are or can become more effective peacemakers, offering hospitality to strangers and building bridges of reconciliation among peoples of diverse races, ethnicities, and orientations
- **Peacemaking and religions of the world,** to explore means by which religious leaders are addressing forms of violence that are supposedly religious-inspired.
- Peacemaking in the face of state sanctioned-violence, to explore peacemaking
  and its relationship to various other contemporary movements for social
  transformation in the context of state-sanctioned violence
- **Peacemaking for the economy and the ecology**, to explore how religious leaders are addressing both forms of eco-peacemaking in our era.

Presenters will be invited to participate in the full conference, providing them with an opportunity to meet and share ideas with globally renowned religious leaders, policy makers, and scholars — including confirmed keynote speakers and participants.

Proposals must include full name, institutional affiliation, e-mail address, a 100-word bio in narrative form, and an abstract of no more than 250 words.
