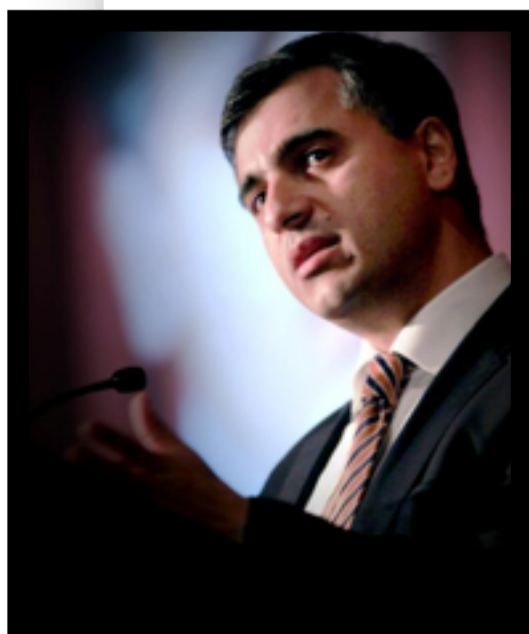

Nika Khanjani is a film and video producer and writer in Montreal. Her work explores memory, dislocation, and relationships with urban geographies. Nika was born in Iran and raised in the US. She spent two years in Iran teaching in an underground university for students who are denied access to post-secondary education. Nika is a Master of Fine Arts candidate at Concordia University.

Dr. Frank Chalk is a leader in genocide studies and is a Concordia professor of History and the Director of the Montreal Institute for Genocide and Human Rights Studies. Dr. Chalk's current research focuses on radio and TV broadcasting in the incitement and prevention of genocide and a project on the life stories of Montrealers who escaped from persecution and mass atrocity crimes.



Dr. Payam Akhavan is a McGill Law professor, specializing in public international law, international criminal law and transitional justice, with a particular interest in human rights and multiculturalism, war crimes prosecutions, UN reform and the prevention of genocide. Professor Akhavan was the first Legal Advisor to the Prosecutor's Office of the International Criminal Tribunals for Former Yugoslavia and Rwanda and is the president and co-founder of the Iran Human Rights Documentation Centre.
