OVERVIEW

The Humanitarian Studies Initiative for Residents (HSIR) is a collaborative educational program designed to train medical residents who wish to work in complex humanitarian relief settings.

HSIR provides participants with a robust training in current humanitarian issues as well as the methodologies and essential skills that best prepare humanitarian workers to operate in the field while allowing the residents to complete the requirements of their individual programs. HSIR program faculty come from institutions such as McGill University, Concordia, Dalhousie, Harvard, Tufts, MIT, Boston University, University of Chicago and directly from the international humanitarian relief community. Each has specialized areas of expertise in the evolving field of humanitarian studies and teaches from a Sphere-Standards based sector approach. The curriculum includes human rights based emergency public health, communicable disease management, water and sanitation, shelter, media interaction, nutrition, forensics, personal security, research, international law and advocacy, and civilian-military relations.

McGill HSIR participants will gain:

- A solid base in the theory of humanitarian studies
- A working knowledge of international public health issues and government, nongovernmental organizations and infrastructure around the world
- Competency-based training in humanitarian field work Intensive field experience
- · A McGill-based research mentor
- A network of health professionals working in humanitarian research and relief
- · A final project of publishable quality



McGill HSIR residents will be able to:

- Advance the specialty of humanitarian medicine and practice worldwide
- Lead effective humanitarian relief and disaster response efforts in conjunction with international aid organizations and local governments
- Develop, implement and evaluate acute-phase and longer-term development programs
- Conduct clinical and field research based on solid epidemiologic methods and biostatistics

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CURRICULUM

The HSIR program begins July 1st and lasts

one year. It may be extended to two years

to provide flexibility for residency scheduling.
