

EARLY PREVENTION AND PUBLIC POLICY: How can the available tools be used?

Current debates about possible crimes against humanity in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Sudan and Syria raise the question of historical precedents for early and effective external engagement that could have or actually did turn key actors away from committing mass atrocities. This workshop will examine what lessons we can learn from the cases of Nazi Germany and the Holocaust, the fall of the apartheid government in South Africa, the Rwandan Genocide, British intervention against warlords in Sierra Leone and the post-election killings in Kenya to inform public policy today.
