- Kimberley Process Certification Scheme chairman Boaz Hirsch joined the rank of those called for Zimbabwe to be banned from the KP. He also demanded the release of Centre for Research and Development director, Farai Maguwu, and described his arrest as "harassment and mistreatment of the civil society members." He added that "The Kimberley Process was founded on the basis of respect for the rights of all its members, governments, the diamond industry and civil society."
- "The KP cannot and will not accept injurious actions taken against any of its members, all the more, if they are carried out by a participating government."
- Minister Mpofu replied that the KP chairman's threats were ill-advised since and his arguments based on false information. Mpofu said he has gotten his information from those trying to demonize gems from Chiadzwa. He also said the harassment reports had not come to the government's attention and so the veracity of the reports was unsure. He argued that the KPCS is "not an institution that should feed on documents or reports any material protected by the national laws of a participant from disclosure and acquired fraudulently and unlawfully by the civil society."
- Las week, Minister Mopfu also stated that it was "mischievous for anyone" to link the Maguwu case with diamonds mining or with the ministry.

- While India, Russia and most African countries backed Zimbabwe, the Herald declares that the US, Australia and the EU believe Zimbabwe has not met minimum requirements.
